

Work Rights

South Australian Government Jobs & Provisional Visa Holders



This fact sheet is for South Australian employers and migrants with work rights.

South Australian government leads the way enabling agencies to employ temporary, provisional or permanent migrants with work rights in Australia, in casual, temporary or ongoing public sector roles. This follows the release of a [Commissioner for Public Sector Employment](#) ruling that clarifies the employment eligibility of temporary and provisional visa holders.

The ruling is a positive one and it is hoped the government's position will encourage the private sector to make the most of the wealth of talent and skills amongst temporary and provisional visa holders for future employment opportunities.

Check employees work entitlements online

Employers can quickly check a skilled migrants work entitlements through Visa Entitlement Verification Online (VEVO).

VEVO is a free online service that gives visa holders, employers and other registered organisations easy and quick access to visa entitlements and status information 24 hours a day. The visa holder can also print or email their Australian visa details directly to their prospective or current employer from the VEVO system. The visa holder will receive a visa grant letter from the Department of Home Affairs outlining the conditions of their visa.

Provisional visa holders

Immigration SA is a State Government agency responsible for skilled and business migration to South Australia. We work with the Australian Government's Department of Home Affairs to attract eligible skilled and business migrants to South Australia through state nominated visa programs.

The following state-nominated provisional visas have **full work rights and enable visa holders to work full time** within South Australia.

- **489 – Skilled Regional (Provisional) – 4 year visa**
- **475 – Temporary Work (Skilled) – 3 year visa**
- **487 – Skilled Regional Sponsored – 3 year visa**
- **495 – Skilled Independent Regional (Provisional) – 3 year visa**

South Australian nominated provisional visa holders have the opportunity to apply for permanent residency through Home Affairs after living in South Australia for 2 years and being employed full time (working at least 35 hours per week) for a minimum of 12 months in that 2 year period. If successful, they may be granted a permanent visa.
