

Understanding visa holders work rights

The following information is provided to assist visa holders and employers better understand the work rights of visa holders in Australia. This information is intended as a guide only and you are advised to explore the complete conditions for each visa subclass. Employers and visa holders can utilise VEVO to verify work rights.

489	Skilled Regional (Provisional) visa (subclass 489)	Must work in a regional or low-population growth metropolitan area (includes all of SA)	4 years (pathway to permanent 887 visa)	No	Department of Home Affairs
189	Skilled Independent visa (subclass 189)	No restrictions	Permanent	No	Department of Home Affairs
190	Skilled Nominated visa (subclass 190)	No restrictions	Permanent	No	Department of Home Affairs
491	Skilled Work Regional (Provisional) visa (subclass 491)	Must work in a designated regional area of Australia (includes all of SA)	5 years (pathway to permanent 191 visa)	No	Department of Home Affairs
887	Skilled Regional visa (subclass 887)	No restrictions	Permanent	No	Department of Home Affairs
